

Prof. Fleur Johns

Fleur Johns is Professor and Associate Dean of Research in the Faculty of Law at UNSW Australia, working in public international law and legal theory. Fleur studies patterns of governance on the global plane, employing an interdisciplinary approach that draws on the social sciences and humanities. Currently, Fleur's research is focused on new modes of global relation emerging in the context of technological change. She is interested, especially, in the politico-legal implications of introducing data science to decision making in international humanitarian and development work. Her publications include four books and peer-reviewed articles and book chapters in Australian, US, UK, and European publications. Before joining UNSW, Fleur was Co-Director of the Sydney Centre for International Law at the University of Sydney Faculty of Law. Fleur has also been Shimizu Visiting Professor of Law at the LSE, Distinguished Visiting Professor at the University of Toronto Faculty of Law, and Leverhulme Visiting Fellow at Birkbeck College, University of London, among other visiting appointments. Fleur is a graduate of the University of Melbourne (BA, LLB(Hons I)) and Harvard University (LLM, SJD; Menzies Scholar; Laylin Prize; elected Commencement Speaker). Before commencing her academic career, Fleur practised as a corporate lawyer with Sullivan & Cromwell LLP in New York, specialising in international project finance. Fleur has three young children and worked part-time (approximately half-time) between 2005 and 2013.
