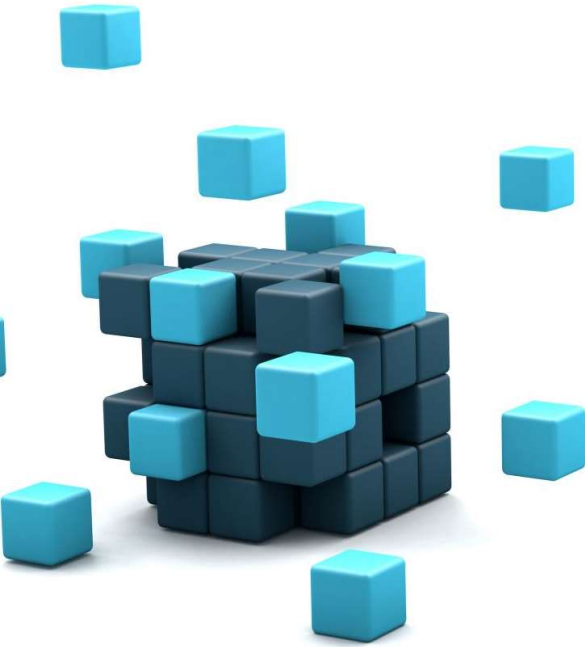

Aim

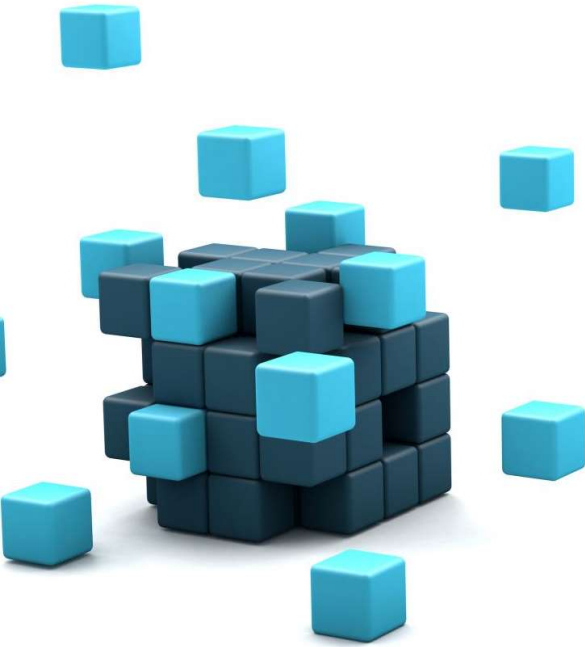


- Exploring the impact of online crime victimization in the UK:
 - Victims' needs
 - The responsibilities of the police, the judiciary and other authorities in dealing with such crimes
- Do the needs of victims of online crimes differ from the needs of victims of traditional offline crime?
- Are current capacities and policies sufficient?

Method

Different methods will be followed in order to explore this topic:

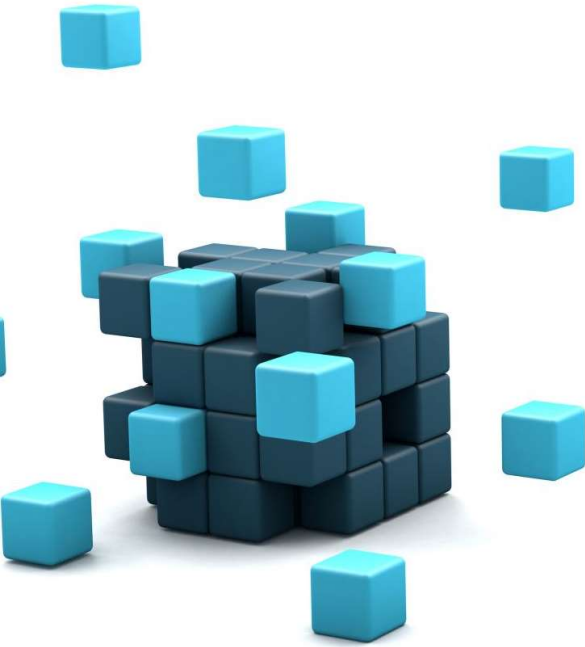
- Explore the victim's perspective.
- Conduct interviews with experts to identify the current landscape of online crime victimization and the capacity of law enforcement and judiciary to handle such cases in the UK (and internationally).
- Conduct focus groups.



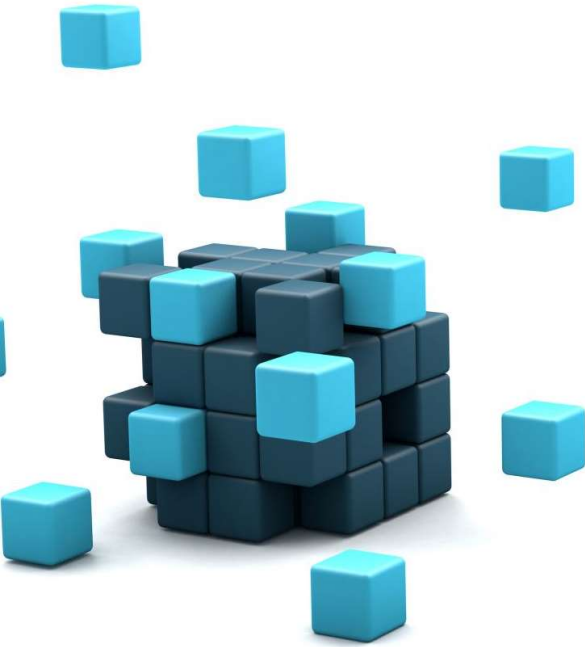
Findings from Victims

- **Data breach victimization**

- To the individuals whose personal data is leaked into the hands of someone unknown to them, the risk of harm is continuing.
- The victims of data breach experienced an extreme violation of their privacy and security of their data.
- Were also victims of fraud (hacked bank accounts).
- Some of the psychological or emotional symptoms described by victims:
 - Feeling frustrated
 - Feeling worry
 - Disappointment
 - Lack of trust
 - Feeling violated
 - Panic
 - Stress
 - Depression/anxiety




Ongoing Work



- **Identifying the need for shaping current victim policy** developed for traditional offline offenses to meet the needs of victims of online crimes.
- **Setting guidelines for training** of law enforcement and judiciary.
- **Identifying the best methods for collecting and sharing data** for such research, e.g. by updating the victim survey data collected from the Institute of Policing for Fraud and Cyber Crime of the City of the City of London Police.
