

The workshops will be configured to connect academics and practitioners to:

- develop a better understanding of intelligence practices
- understand the range and adequacy of different oversight and regulatory measures and consider their relationships to different surveillance powers and intelligence practices. Part of these discussions will involve the analysis of different oversight regimes and learning that can be transferred.

The workshops will be designed to facilitate engagement, to position the researchers, and to provide data collection opportunities for future publications. They will also provide a conduit to disseminate researchers' extant body of research, as well as developing research findings, directly to user communities. We will produce impact-focused briefing papers and workshop summaries that would cite our work. These will be targeted directly towards the IPC, and other UN-level bodies.

The workshops are designed to provide impact to several constituencies. Most explicit will be the orientation of workshop content and configuration to inform the work of the UK government IPC. We will also provide a neutral setting for government bodies to engage with a range of human rights NGOs, privacy advocacy groups and related activist organisations. These latter groups will also provide constituencies for research impact.
