



Pete Fussey is a criminologist specializing in a number of areas including surveillance and society, digital sociology, critical security studies, critical studies of resilience, major-event security, human trafficking and urban sociology. He has published extensively in all these areas, is director of the Surveillance Studies Network and, separately the Centre for Research into Information, Surveillance and Privacy. He currently leads work on law enforcement and national security applications of technology for the ESRC Large Grant on Human Rights and Information Technology in the Era of Big Data. He has also recently concluded working on two large-scale ESRC and EPSRC funded research projects analysing counter-terrorism in the UK's crowded spaces and, separately, future urbanism and resilience towards 2050. His other work focuses on organised crime in the EU with particular reference to human trafficking for criminal exploitation (monograph published by Routledge 2017). Other books include *Securing and Sustaining the Olympic City* (Ashgate) and *Terrorism and the Olympics* (Routledge). In other work, he has also co-authored one of the UK's best-selling criminology textbooks (*Criminology: A Sociological Introduction*) with a team of colleagues from the Department of Sociology at the University of Essex. Pete also serves on the editorial boards of *Surveillance and Society* and the British Sociological Association's journal, *Sociology*.
